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## Welcome

A very warm welcome to the 2025 Flower Show and congratulations to our wonderful Hall on its' Centenary. The generosity of Mrs Brockett Grover gave the Flower Show a marvellous new venue and it is the longest-running annual event since the Hall was built in 1925. In acknowledgment of the Hall's centenary, we have looked at our records and our brochures dating back to the 1960's. Thanks to Chris Budd for donating them.

The 1960's Handicraft Classes included a stitched rug, a summer dress, a material lampshade, a tray cloth stitched with silk and a baby's matinee coat in 2 or 3 ply wool!

In the 1970's advertisers included T and B Wride Dairy; Long Acre Pig and Poultry Co. Ltd; Victoria and Beechey Coal Co. Ltd; Randalls Dairy and Ockwell's High Class Provisions and in 1971, Bailey Caravans Ltd loaned a caravan as an office for the show secretary! We are very grateful and fortunate to have had support from A.S Ockwell "The" Garage every year since 1967 and no doubt, before that!

Back in the 1980's, entries included homemade wine with classes for both sweet and dry red and white wines and the number of classes increased from 66 to 75; due to the expansion of the children's categories. There was also a senior citizen award.

The past brochures give us an interesting insight into the huge changes in society from 1967 to 2025. Our goal is to keep up with these changes whilst maintaining the essence of the village Flower Show which began all the way back in 1896. 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## GENERAL INFORMATION

1. All entries must be made on the enclosed Entry Form. (Cash only)  
Entry forms and fees should be received on or before Wednesday, 25<sup>th</sup> June 2025. Drop-off addresses are on the entry form.
2. Late entries can be accepted subject to space being available up to 10.15am on the day of the show. There is no additional fee for late entries.
3. The hall will be open for staging of entries from 3.30pm to 4.30pm and 6.00pm to 8.00pm on Friday, 27<sup>th</sup> June, and from 8.00am to 10.30am on the morning of the show.
4. All Award winners will be required to sign a written guarantee for the safe return of their Awards four weeks prior to the 2026 show.
5. The raffle will be drawn after the Prize-giving.
6. The hall will be cleared of all persons other than the Judges and those authorised by the committee by 10.30am on the day of the Show. Judging will commence at 11.00am.
7. The Judges are empowered to withhold any prize if, in their opinion, the exhibits are not of sufficient merit.
8. Prize monies can be obtained from the Treasurer after the Awards have been presented or must be claimed within 14 days.
9. The Committee will take all reasonable care but cannot be held responsible for any loss or damage which may occur to the exhibits.

## SHOW RULES

1. No exhibitor shall be allowed to stage more than one exhibit in each class and no class may have more than one entry from the same address. This does not apply to children from the same family. However, each entry must still be individual.
2. All exhibits must have been the bona fide property of, and grown by, the exhibitor .  

This rule does not apply to the Floral Decorative Section (Classes 42 - 47).
3. Exhibitors must provide their own containers for all exhibits.
4. Exhibitors will be responsible for the proper placing of Entry Cards on exhibits.
5. No exhibit may be removed before Awards are presented but exhibitors are asked to clear their exhibits as soon as possible after the raffle.
6. No article which has previously won a prize in the Handicraft Section of the Show may be exhibited.

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# **ROSES**

## **Hybrid Tea**

Hybrid tea flowers are well-formed with large, high-centred buds, supported by long, straight and upright stems. Each flower can grow to 8-12.5 cm wide. Hybrid teas are the largest and most popular group of rose, due to their elegant form and large variety of colours. Their flowers are usually borne singly at the end of long stems which also makes them very popular as cut flowers.

## **Floribunda**

Typical floribundas feature stiff shrubs, smaller and bushier than the average hybrid tea but less dense and sprawling than the average polyantha. The flowers are often smaller than hybrid teas but are carried in large sprays, giving a better floral effect in the garden. Floribundas are found in all hybrid tea colours and with the classic hybrid tea-shaped blossom, sometimes differing from hybrid teas only in their cluster-flowering habit.

## **Shrub**

Shrub roses, also known as landscape roses, are a group of modern types including varieties that don't fall under any of the other available classifications. They are known for their robust, bushy growth habit and often have a more informal, natural appearance.

## **Climbing/Rambling**

The primary distinction lies in how and when these roses bloom. Climbing roses, often referred to as modern climbers, are repeat bloomers. They begin flowering in late spring and can continue through summer and autumn as long as conditions allow. However, some climbing varieties may bloom less prolifically, depending on their parentage and environmental conditions. In contrast, rambling roses typically bloom just once per year, usually in late spring or early summer. Their flowering period is short but breath-taking, producing a profusion of clustered blooms that resemble their wild rose relatives.

## **Miniature**

Miniature roses are a type of rose plant that are selectively bred to remain small in size, typically reaching heights of 12 to 24 inches, and are known for their compact growth habit and repeat-flowering nature.

## **PRESENTATION**

Roses need careful selection before cutting. Ones with buds that are too tight are unlikely to develop in water. Too open flowers will 'blow' and be too far advanced for judging. Cut roses at approximately half-open stage. Roses are best staged in a staging medium, e.g. chicken wire, small gravel or stones. Stems will be easier to place and will not twist, turn or flop.



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

# FRUIT AND VEGETABLE CLASSES (OPEN)

## PRESENTATION

Gooseberries, raspberries and strawberries should be shown on the stalk.

Rhubarb, which has been grown naturally, (i.e. not forced) should have the leaf blades removed, approximately 3" / 7.5cm of a blade should be left attached to a stalk. The base should be pulled and not cut.

Broad beans, peas and mangetout should be of uniform size and quality.

Root vegetables should be washed with a soft sponge and plenty of water. Never use a brush. Select specimens of even size and shape.

The **C. A. Brighton Challenge Cup** will be awarded to the exhibitor winning the most points in Classes 29 - 41.

### PLEASE NOTE:

The RHS has suggested avoiding the use of the toxic, non-biodegradable floral foam, commonly known as Oasis. Alternative support may be used e.g. chicken wire, gravel, glass beads, pin head, wooden skewers etc.

**There are no late entries for Classes 42-45 & 47. Entry forms must be submitted on or before Wednesday 25<sup>th</sup> June, in order to reserve a space for your exhibit. Only Class 46 may be entered on the day of the show.**

**NB** You don't need to be a flower arranger to enter. All you need to do is use the flowers and greenery in the best condition possible, aim for undamaged leaves and the best condition flowers! All entries could be in a vase/jug if you prefer.

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# CULINARY CLASS FOR RESIDENTS

The Lane Cup will be awarded to the winner of Class 48. The Class is only open to residents within a 4-mile radius of Peterston-super-Ely.

## 48. Family Fruit Cake using the recipe given below:

### RECIPE

8oz self-raising flour	pinch of salt	$\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon mixed spice
4oz soft brown sugar (light)	3oz margarine	10oz mixed dried fruit
2oz glace cherries (chopped)	about $\frac{1}{4}$ pint of milk	1 large egg lightly beaten

Cooking guidelines: 1 - 1½ hours. Oven: 180°C / 350°F / Gas Mark 4.

Grease a 7" round tin well and line the base with greased greaseproof paper. Sieve together the flour, salt and spice. Rub in the margarine. Add sugar, fruit and cherries, then the egg and sufficient milk so that the mixture will drop from the spoon when shaken. Turn into the prepared tin. Bake in a moderately hot oven for one hour or until the cake is golden and a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. Leave in the tin for 5 minutes. Turn out onto a wire rack and cool.

### A FEW CULINARY TIPS

When a recipe includes eggs, it is usually a medium-size egg weighing approx. 2oz / 56g. Using a different size egg may alter the consistency of your recipe.

Sponge Cakes: Victoria or jam/cream filled sandwiches always have a plain top, although many are sprinkled with sugar. When entering a competition, be on the safe side and leave plain. Decorated sponge means what it says - but only decorate the top! If you decorate the sides with cream, it then becomes a gâteau.

A Pickle is a combination of fruit, or vegetables, or both, preserved in spiced vinegar. Chutney is usually made up of fruit and/or vegetables cooked in acids, spices and sugars.

**It is required that all culinary exhibits are covered.** All entries will be covered by a Flower Show Cover. Place your entry on a plate after unwrapping it. All covers are property of the Flower Show, so do not remove.
